

# Conflict Incident Monthly Tracker

## Imo State: August-September 2019

### Background

This monthly tracker is designed to update Peace Agents on patterns and trends in conflict risk and violence, as identified by the Integrated Peace and Development Unit (IPDU) early warning system, and to seek feedback and input for response to mitigate areas of conflict.

### Patterns and Trends June-August 2019

According to Peace Map data (see Figure 1), there has been an increase in lethal violence in Imo State since June 2019. Incidents reported in the state during this period included criminality, human trafficking, Violence Affecting Women and Girls (VAWG), and protest.

**Criminality:** In July, security operatives reportedly killed three kidnapping suspects and rescued seven kidnap victims from a hideout of kidnappers in Ilile Forest, Ohaji/Egbema LGA. Separately, residents reportedly caught a herdsman with 88 life bullets in Obudi Agwa community, Oguta LGA. The suspect was handed over to the police. In August, gunmen suspected to be cultists reportedly attacked residents and killed five people in Ilile community, Ohaji/Egbema LGA. Several others sustained injuries during the incident. Separately, the wife of an Anglican Bishop was reportedly kidnapped by gunmen in Ekemele, Ikeduru LGA. Separately, two persons were reportedly injured during a clash between two factions of herders over cattle rustling in Agbala, Owerri North LGA.

**Human Trafficking:** In June, a Cameroonian woman was reportedly arrested for attempting to sell a 6-year old boy in Owerri Municipal LGA.

**Violence Affecting Women and Girls (VAWG):** In addition to the impact of criminality on women and girls listed above, other incidents of violence against women and girls were reported during this period. In July, for instance, a 25-year old man reportedly raped and murdered a 27-year old female member of the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) in Mgbidi community, Oru LGA. In August, a man reportedly killed his 16-year old niece, threw the corpse into a pit and stole the victim's 1-week old baby in Owerri town, Owerri Municipal LGA. He sold the baby for three hundred thousand naira. Separately, a lady was reportedly strangled

by her male partner in a hotel in Owerri town, Owerri Municipal LGA. The suspect hid the corpse under the bed and fled. In another incident, women protested over the rape of a girl in Oboku-Avu community, Owerri West LGA.

**Other Fatalities:** In July, a policeman reportedly shot dead a young man during a disagreement at a restaurant in Otoko community, Obowo LGA. The incident sparked off a protest by youths in the community who set a police station ablaze and freed some detainees.

**Protest:** In June, there was a protest by some local government chairmen and councilors at the premises of the State House of Assembly in Owerri, the state capital, over alleged plans by the state government to terminate their tenure.

Figure 1: Incidents and Fatalities, Imo State

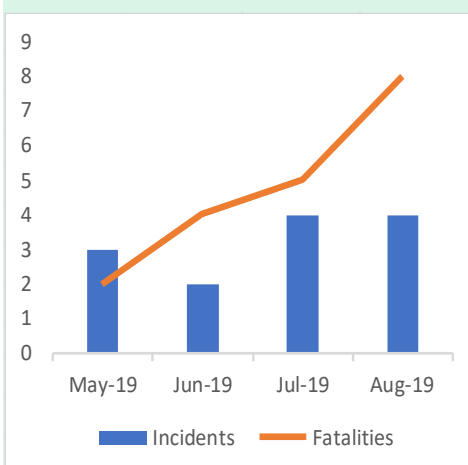
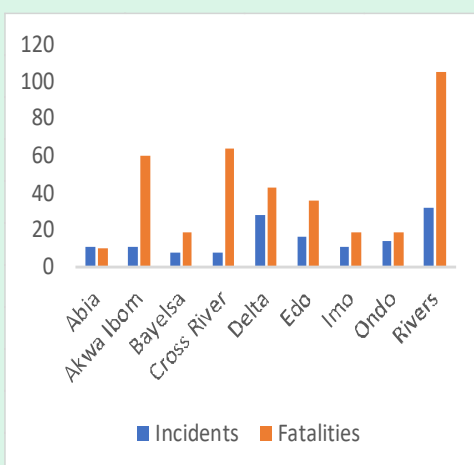


Figure 2: Incidents and Fatalities, Niger Delta (May - August 2019)

## Recent Incidents, September 2019

Incidents during the month related mainly to kidnapping for ransom and protest.

**Kidnapping:** During the month, a 19-year old boy and two others were reportedly arrested by the police for kidnapping in Owerri Town, Owerri Municipal LGA. The suspects were arrested while they were waiting to collect a ransom from the relatives of a kidnap victim.

**Protest:** There was a protest by youths over the ruling of an election petition tribunal for Imo West Senatorial District in Owerri Municipal LGA. The protesters reportedly blocked major roads and prevented vehicular movement in the area. Separately, there was a protest by residents over an alleged plan to establish Rural Gracing Area (RUGA) settlements for herders in Umuneke community, Ngor Okpala LGA.

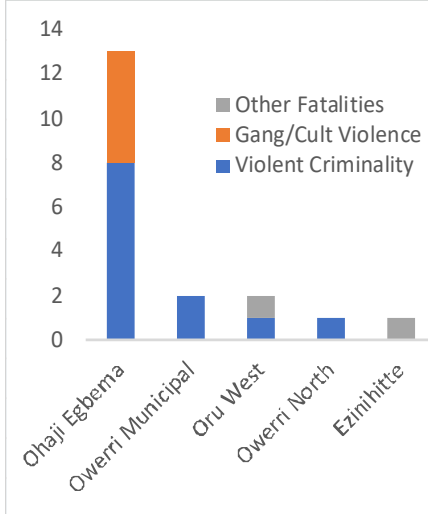
## Prognosis

Conflict risk and lethal violence in Imo state during this period were driven mainly by criminality, protests, human trafficking, sexual violence, and other Violence Affecting Women and Girls (VAWG). Peace Agents must continue to monitor the situation closely and respond appropriately.

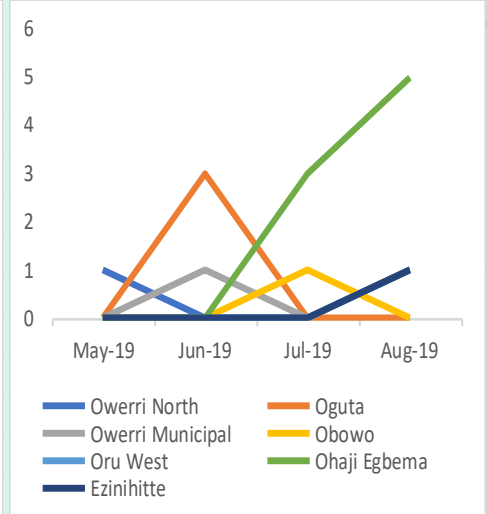
## Questions for Peace Agents

3. What are some likely trigger events in the next 6 months that could escalate this conflict?
4. Who are the key stakeholders that have influence on the conflict?
5. What will you do to help mitigate the conflict in the short, medium, and long term?

**Figure 3: Conflict Fatalities by LGA (June - August 2019)**

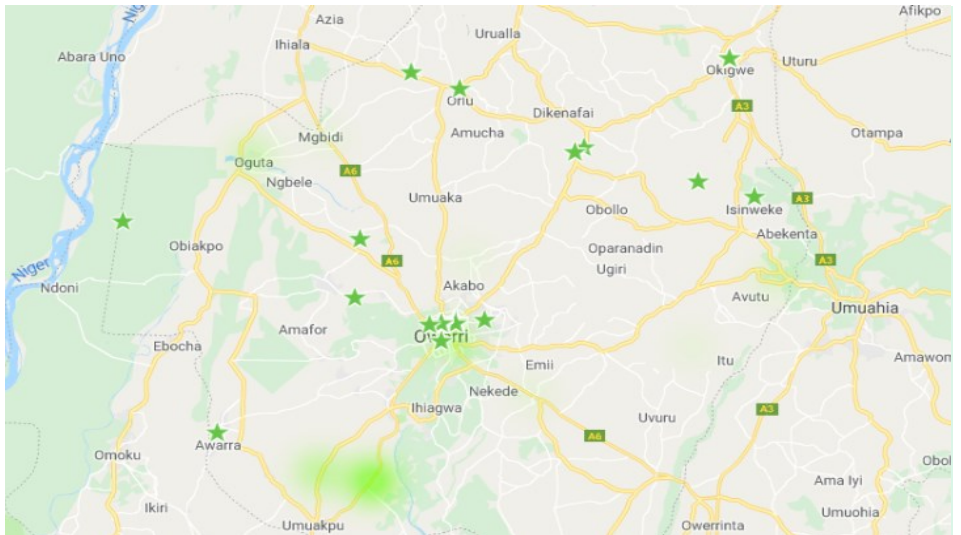


**Figure 4: Conflict Fatalities by LGA**
