Through partnership and collaborations, we hope to develop and execute policies that will help to develop the education system in Nigeria.



THE SECOND EDITION OF THE RISING CHILD FOUNDATION ANNUAL SPELLING BEE COMPETITION

ising Child Foundation is keen on achieving her set vision and mission, one of which is helping to achieve the fourth goal (i.e Quality Education) of the global goals for sustainable development in Nigeria, through reading enrichment programs such as Spelling Bee and Essay competition. In furtherance of the said commitment, the foundation organized yet another edition of the spelling Bee Competition tagged "KWARA SPELLING BEE 2.0" in conjunction with Kwara State Universal Basic Board. The competition held on Thursday, 14th of March 2019 at Bishop Smith Memorial College, GRA, Ilorin, Kwara state.

BENEFICIARIES AND IMPACTS

The competition was amongst Public Primary Schools in Kwara senatorial district, in which two pupils each represented twenty-five schools (25), to make a total of fifty (50) participants. At the end of the final round, **MUHIDEEN MARYAM** from Model L.G.E.A emerged as the winner of this year's edition.

A Spell-off challenge for invited pupils from Private Schools also featured in this year's edition. Participants came prepared for the competition as they all displayed great poise





and enthusiasm throughout the competition. The pronouncer ensured that new and tricky words spelt wrongly were re-pronounced and learnt by the participants before progressing to the next round. This way, the event also opened up a learning avenue alongside the competition. The confidence level of the participants was also a thing to reckon with. We believe that all of these social skills will help these pupils succeed alongside their academic feats. Consequently, we make bold to say that the event was a success as the objectives aimed at were all exhibited by the participants.

AUDIENCE

The audience constituted of officials from Kwara State Universal Basic Education Board, teachers, pupils and school owners from public and private schools respectively, volunteers and well-wishers of the foundation. Appreciable decorum was maintained by the audience, and this aided the confidence at which the participants spelt.

During it's third edition of #SmallGestureBigDifference, Rising Child Foundation partnered with **Home Street Kids Initiative** to reach out to over 300 street children in Ilorin, Kwara State.

As part of the program, Rising Child Foundation introduced the MyBodyIsMyBody program created by Chrissy Sykes for the children to sensitize them (especially the girls) on sexual abuse prevention and reiterate to them the need to speak up when they have been sexually abused.

Street children are vulnerable to sexual exploitations on a daily basis and it is important

to continue to sensitize them to know that their body is their own and no one has the right to hurt them or touch their private parts.

To drill in our message to the kids, the song/message was translated to Hausa, the major language of the street children in kofar Gambari community of llorin.

The program ended with loads of food, music and gifts.



LITERACY FOR A BETTER WORLD



60% of primary school children in developing countries fail to achieve minimum proficiency in reading, writing, and basic math-Vice President, Human Development, The World Bank Enhancing literacy levels are not only important for academic achievements but lifelong success.

As part of Rising Child Foundation efforts to increase access to literacy and Education in Kwara State, we set up the first ever little library at Home Street Kids Initiative, Ilorin, a school for street children. We strongly believe the library will go a long way to support the children's learning and encourage them to #ReadADay.

An interesting fact about the little library is that, it is managed by the children (under the supervision of their teachers) to equip them with early leadership and management skills.

As part of it's sustainability, Rising Child Foundation will hold monthly Storytelling sessions at the school to read the story books and discuss the lessons learnt

ow in its second year, Rising Child Foundation Annual Essay Competition seeks to encourage and bring forth the writing and creative tendencies of children in Nigeria. This year we ask students to submit entries on the topic-

QUALITY EDUCATION FOR POVERTY ALLEVIATION: CONNECTING THE DOTS TO SDGS.

We received 11 entries from students in Kwara, Ekiti and Abuja. After careful review of the applications by our Judging Committee, TITILAYO ASEKUN from GOVERNMENT SECONDARY SCHOOL KUJE, ABUJA emerged the winner and IDRIS RUQOYYAH of AT'TAWHEED MODEL SCHOOLS, ADO-EKITI took the second place.

Here is what the Judging Committee has got to say:

"We the judges deeply appreciate all the entrants for their exhibition of knack, guts, braveness and talent in putting their respective pens to paper. It is trite that one of the main aim of the competition is to unleash the entrants' creativity and ingenuity. Unlike the previous edition, the entries weren't very rich in creativity as most entrants didn't take cognizance of plagiarism hence, falling short of our expectations.





It is recommended that the Foundation sensitize the entrants on the rubrics of essay writing for contests specifically — with emphasis on plagiarism and structure". (RCF Judging Committee, 2019).

Rising Child Foundation is aware of the dearth of writing skills among students in Nigeria and we shall keep doing more to ensure this gap is reduced.
