
Niger Delta Weekly: Deescalating Rising Wave of Kidnap for Ransom in Akwa Ibom State

May 19-25, 2024

Background


This weekly update spotlights organized criminal violence in the Niger Delta with a focus on kidnap for ransom in Akwa Ibom State. Kidnap for ransom is becoming increasingly prevalent and intense in the State. According to data (see map below), more than 50 kidnapping incidents and over 25 related fatalities were reported in Akwa Ibom State between January 2020 and March 2024. Recent data shows a rise in kidnapping incidents in the State. In March 2024, for instance, a local government official and his wife were reportedly abducted by kidnappers in front of their residence along Oron Road in Uyo, the state capital. In April, gunmen suspected to be kidnappers reportedly killed a businessman and abducted a woman along Airport Road in Uyo, the state capital. They were attacked on their way from the farm. Also, in April, a medical doctor was reportedly abducted by gunmen in Oron LGA. In May, a four-month-old baby was allegedly abducted at gunpoint in Enen-Atai village, Itu LGA. More recently, on May 18, 2024, a traditional ruler was allegedly abducted by gunmen at his palace in Ebughu community, Mbo LGA.

Why it Matters

The recent escalation of kidnap for ransom could negatively impact the dynamics of peace and security in the State. If not deescalated, the situation could intensify in ways that could cause a general feeling of uncertainty, fear and distrust. The fear of being kidnapped could scare off investors and force businesses to relocate. Payment of ransom could deplete household savings and destabilize legitimate businesses. This could cause serious hardship for families and undermine the health, economic and social wellbeing of residents.

Anticipated Trends and Dynamics

The current trends and patterns of kidnapping has the potential to intensify in ways that could negatively impact the socio-economic, political, and security situations in the State. Stakeholders should collaborate with the relevant security agencies to intensify ongoing efforts to deescalate the situation. Peace actors should work with relevant government agencies, civil society organizations, and community leaders to develop appropriate developmental strategies to tackle the drivers of the current wave of kidnappings in the State.
