
Niger Delta Weekly: Preventing Violence During Local Council Elections in Akwa Ibom & Rivers

Background


This special edition of the weekly update spotlights election violence in the Niger Delta with a focus on the forthcoming October 05, 2024 local government elections in Akwa Ibom and Rivers States. Generally, elections in the Niger Delta are highly competitive, often characterized by violence. According to data (see map below), over 420 incidents of election violence and more than 150 fatalities were reported in the Niger Delta between January 2020 and June 2024. Recent elections in Rivers State have been marred by violence, especially governorship and local elections. In the lead-up to the upcoming local elections, political tensions have seemingly intensified in Akwa Ibom and Rivers States. In June 2024, for instance, two persons, including a police officer, were reportedly killed during clashes between supporters of different political groups over the tenure of local government chairpersons in Omuma LGA, Rivers State. In July, the chieftains of a major political party were reportedly attacked and injured by political thugs during a meeting to choose a candidate ahead of the local council elections in Itu LGA, Akwa Ibom State.

Why it Matters

The political situation in Akwa Ibom and Rivers State is seemingly highly charged ahead of the forthcoming local government elections, including power tussle between political actors. The situation has the potential to intensify and cause violence and irregularities during the elections, especially against the backdrop of the recent Supreme Court ruling that granted financial autonomy to local governments in the country. Violence and irregularities during the elections could adversely affect the dynamics of conflict and insecurity in the region.

Anticipated Trends and Dynamics

Based on historical trends and recent data, the political situation could escalate and intersect with communal tensions and organized criminality. Peace actors, including civil society organizations should collaborate with the government and relevant security agencies to de-escalate the situation. Stakeholders should continue to promote non-violent electioneering process through popular media outlets and forums. This should include measures to reduce fake news and misinformation, and facilitate dialogue between key political actors.
