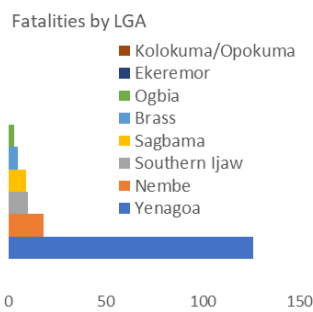
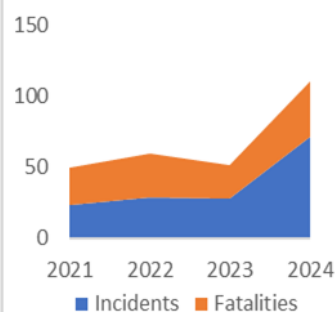
Addressing the Resurgence of Cult Gang Violence and Killings in Bayelsa State

May 18-24, 2025

This update spotlights the surge in gang violence in the Niger Delta, focusing on cult-related killings in Bayelsa State. Clashes between rival cult groups continue to be a major driver of violence and insecurity in the state. Recent data indicates a resurgence of killings by cult gangs, primarily linked to disputes over the collection of illegal levies.



Trends and Flashpoints of Cult-related Gang Violence in Bayelsa State

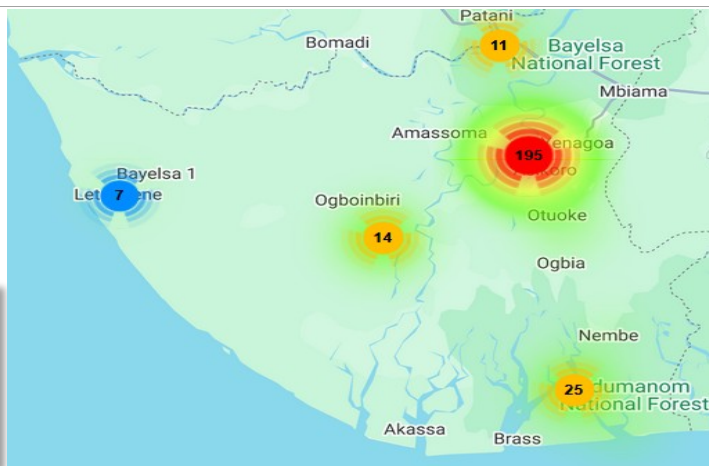


Anticipated Trends and Dynamics

The resurgence of gang violence has triggered a wave of reprisal killings. This escalation could lead to prolonged battles for supremacy and territorial control among cult groups. If unchecked, it could further intensify communal tension and criminality in the state.

Actions Taken to Mitigate the Situation

In response to the surge in gang violence, the state government, security agencies, and community leaders have launched coordinated efforts to improve public safety, with a strategic focus on community engagement through the Bayelsa Community Safety Corps (BCSC).

Timeline of Recent Incidents of Cult-related Gang Violence

May 09, 2025

Cultists reportedly killed two university graduates in Gbarabtoru-Ekpetiama community, Yenagoa Local government Area (LGA).

April 24, 2025

A cult leader was reportedly killed by members of his own gang during a leadership tussle in the Azikoro area of Yenagoa, the State Capital.

April 20, 2025

Four people were reportedly killed by cultists in Swali community, Yenagoa, during a violent clash over control of market revenue.

March 03, 2025

A lingering cult war reportedly led to the death of a 30-year-old man as rival gang violence resurfaced in Yenagoa, the State Capital.
